# Return of the Big Cheese Festival



Set in the looming shadow of Wales' largest castle, Caerphilly's Big Cheese Festival returns for a 19th year of family fun and entertainment.

Caerphilly town centre will transform into a bustling cacophony of street entertainers, living history encampments, music, dance, and funfair rides, with over 80,000 people expected to visit over the free event between Friday, July 29 and Sunday, July 31.

The jam-packed three-day festival kicks off with a bang on Friday July 29, with the legendary Great Cheese Race pro-

viding plenty of entertainment around the castle grounds at 6.30pm, with music, entertainment and the famous firework show rounding off the rest of the opening night.

Throughout Saturday and Sunday, there is food, stalls, and shows galore, ensuring there's something for everyone.

Whether you feast at the food and cheese market, shop in the craft market, or step back in time with medieval re-enactments, this year's Big Cheese Festival is set to be the most wide-ranging yet.

# THE GREAT **CHEESE RACE**

The Great Cheese Race will see teams of four people race around the grounds of Caerphilly Castle carrying a 'Big Cheese'.

Runners will be under starter's orders at 6.30pm on Friday July 29.

Adult team members must be aged 16 or over and juniors aged between eight and 15.

There will be prizes on offer for teams in the best fancy dress, as well as prizes for race winners.

# **RE-ENACTMENTS**

Head over to the re-enactment areas to witness pieces of living history. With performances on Saturday and Sunday, there's no excuse not to watch.

<u>Pembrokeshire</u> Falconry 11.45am and 5pm Experience the thrill of the peregrine falcon stooping overhead at more than 100 miles per hour, followed by the majestic soaring of the red kite, and the giant presences of the vulture and

These are just some of the birds of prey you can expect to encounter in their displays.

<u>National Roman Legion Museum</u> <u>- 11.45am and 4.15pm</u>

Watch authentic recreations from the Roman era come to



life with military practices and a fascinating display.

Y Cantref Breiniol - 2pm Enjoy a piece of civilian history with this educational display of a living history encampment.

<u>Company of Chivalry - 2.45pm</u> The Company of Chivalry is a living history group portraying a Military Company in the age of Edward III, under the command of Sir Thomas Hungerford, a Vassal of John of Gaunt 1st Duke of Lancaster.

The group performs at Medieval Reenactment events; with civilian Living History and military Combat Display aspects.

The Company of Chivalry is well-known for its vivid display of daily life in a medieval camp.

The group has the only fully trained Medieval Siege Engine

Crew in the United Kingdom, and regularly displays the use of four types of Siege Engine at Caerphilly Castle.

The Vikings - 12.30pm and <u>3.30pm</u>

If you've ever wanted to try your hand at surviving in a different period of history, The Vikings audience participation display will delight and educate, with battle training and living encampments straight out of the 10th Century.

<u>Cardiff Castle Garrison - 2pm</u> How we lived during the reign of Edward III.

See and hear how food is traditionally prepared and cooked over an open hearth.

Watch craft, take a look at clothing, weapons and armour of the 14th Century.

# **VISITOR** INFORMATION

On site facilities:

Toilets, baby-changing facilities, breastfeeding area, food and drink refreshments, licensed bar, Information Centre.

There are designated picnic areas on the event site for you to relax with your blankets and hampers and take in the event atmosphere.

There are also many picnic benches to sit down on and take time to chill and enjoy the atmosphere.

Off site facilities:

Toilets (below the Visit Caerphilly Centre and at the top of Caerphilly town upon exiting the Caerphilly Interchange), cash machines, pubs, restaurants, shopping centre.

All within a five-minute walk of the event site.


<u>Disabled facilities:</u> Access to the site is good from all entrances, ground conditions are generally flat with a few uneven areas.

The site is mainly on grass. All park-and-ride buses are equipped with low floor access and a number have wheelchair lifts.

There are limited disabled parking facilities located at the event site.

Crescent Road car park and the Twyn car park both have designated disabled bays and are located near the event site.

However, these car parks get full early on in the day. It is advised that visitors use the disabled parking situated at the St Cenydd School parkand-ride facility.

On Friday July 29, a park-and-ride will operate from Y Gwyndy Campus on Pontygwindy Road, with buses running from 1.30pm - 10.45pm. There is no fee on the

Friday.
On Saturday July 30 and Sunday,
July 31, a park and walk will be in
operation from Y Gwyndy Campus on Pontygwindy Road at a fee of £2 per car. There are no buses transporting visitor from this site to the event. Visitors will need to walk to the event site. The site is open for parking between 10am and 8pm.

There will be a park-and-ride from St Cenydd School in Trecenydd and Bedwas High School. Both car parks will be operating at a fee of £5 per car, with buses running from 10am to 7.45pm.

For park-and-ride, follow the temporary signs from the A470, A469 and A468.

Disabled parking is located at St Cenydd School Park & Ride.

The drop-off and collection point for Bedwas High Park-and-ride is Castle Court Shopping Centre Bus stop at the front of the castle in the town centre. St Cenydd School park-and-ride buses will drop off and collect on Nantgarw Road at the end of the event site.

On Friday, July 29, the park-and-ride bus from Y Gwyndy campus will drop and collect on Nantgarw Road at the end of the event site.

To avoid congestion and unnecessary delays in getting to the event please head for one of the park-andrides as signposted.
